1 Sutton Recreation Ground and Memorial Hall Trust **£ 2,500**

Sutton Recreation Ground Hedge Renewal and Wild Flower Area Creation

Plant a native species hedge with guards and fence. Sow adjacent wild flower area with light fencing protection.

2 PHOEBE **£ 1,900**

Ambling African Women

To support nature walks for black, minoritised and migrant women.

3 Kate Lemon **£ 1,290**

Get on your Bike

Encourage local communities to get on their bike, and in doing so, gain increased awareness of local nature, green transport options for the environment and improve their health & wellbeing.

4 Creative Curve **£ 4,990**

Repairing The Fens Access Road

Improve and repair access road onto 'The Fens' Common to address issues for mobility scooter users, buggies, walkers and erosion widening the road into unsuitable areas of mud on Common

5 Hollesley Parish Council **£ 500**

Hollesley Recreation Ground Oak Trees

To commission a veteran oak tree and wildlife survey, together with management recommendations, to support the longevity of thirteen oak trees at Hollesley Recreation Ground as well as to benefit the native wildlife species that are supported by the trees and hedgerow. This survey is to inform a future plan for work to conserve the trees and enhance the natural beauty of the landscape.

6 Art Branches **£ 2,500**

Poems from the sea

Poetry and print workshops run in-situ at Orford and Dunwich beach.

7 The Bench Project **£3,000**

Noticing Nature

This is a landmark project within the unique setting of Snape Maltings. The Bench Project will create a seating area that will enable a connection between residents, visitors and the natural environment.

8 Sutton Hoo Ship's Company **£2,500**

Engaging and educating the public

To enhance how Sutton Hoo Ship's Company engage and educate the public about their work to build a reconstruction of the Anglo-Saxon ship from Mound 1 at Sutton Hoo. This grant supports the purchase of an outdoor gazebo to use outside the Longshed for engaging with the public.

9 The Woodbridge Tidemill

£2,500

The Three H's (Heritage, Habitat and Health) of the Woodbridge Tide Mill: The funding will support a multifaceted community and conservation programme. This project aims to enhance the Museum's physical condition, environmental contribution, inclusivity, and educational outreach.

10 Warden's Trust

£500

This grant supports an ecological survey and management plan for the Warden's Trust Bunnies' Wood, leading to an enhanced nature area that is more resilient to climate change and a green space for visitors to the new campsite to enjoy: Bunnies' Wood was planted about 18 years ago. It is an area of mainly deciduous native English Trees, which runs along the boundary of Warden's Trust, adjacent to the coastal path. This grant supports an ecological survey and management plan for Bunnie's Wood.

11 Groundwork East

£2,000

Nature@Work – School Grounds Improvements

Nature@Work aims to boost 100 public wildflower sites, enhancing biodiversity and helping educate and inform the wider public and inspire more nature boosting activity in schools and public green spaces. This grant supports the delivery of education sessions in two primary schools within the fund area to engage children with enhancing the school grounds for wildlife.

12 Dunwich Greyfriars Trust

£2,000

Greyfriars Mower Project

Purchase of a heavy duty ride-on motor mower to maintain the grass cutting regime around the delicate heritage Greyfriars ruins, and maintain access pathways for visitors.

13 National Trust

£1,500

Dunwich Heath Wildlife Discovery: Improved engagement of visitors in wildlife & conservation. New equipment & resources for environmental education related events/visits, including family-friendly 'borrow bags' to support staff-led or self-led exploration of site.

14 Dunwich Community Heritage Centre

£ 3,800

Next Steps: Art and Nature: A series of drop-in and booked activities combining art and nature, bring the natural world to the forefront of the work of the Heritage Centre.
