1 BDMLR - British Divers Marine Life Rescue (Suffolk group) Awarded £698

Suffolk Seal Rescue

Suffolk Seal Rescue comprises trained volunteer medics who save endangered seals. We monitor, rescue and care for seal pups, enabling rehabilitation and release. We seek equipment/supplies to sustain the project.

2 Waldringfield Wildlife Group Awarded £669

Wild for Wildlife: The Waldringfield Wildlife Explorers

The Waldringfield Wildlife Explorers via its Wild for Wildlife Events will create opportunities for children and their families living in and around Waldringfield to learn about the rural and coastal landscapes around them and to take an active role in conserving the varied eco systems they support.

3 Suffolk Bird Group Awarded £660

Suffolk Nest Box Support (SNBS)

We aim to raise awareness of migrant woodland and waterside bird species in need of conservation assistance, install nest boxes in areas where suitable habitat exists, and encourage community-based observation of the species.

4 GreenSnape Community Group Awarded £657

Enhancing Snape's natural environment (Brushcutter and training)

To enable GreenSnape volunteers to keep paths and rides clear in Priory Wood and Snape Common Wood and maintain and enhance wildflower areas both in these woodlands, on Church Common and on the large area of verges throughout Snape.

5 GreenSnape Community Group Awarded £631.50

Boosting Bats in Snape

Initially, to conduct bat walks learning how to use the detectors, then bat surveys with GreenSnape volunteers and the local community to establish the populations that we have in Snape Common Wood and Snape village. This will inform conservation work to protect bats, create hibernation sites, install more bat boxes around the village and enhance understanding of bats both in Suffolk and nationally.

6 Shotley Community Primary School Awarded £750

Shotley Primary Schools Sustainable Garden and Nature Area

Re-development of the schools existing nature area to allow for the development of raised beds for teaching pupils how to grow their own produce combine with natural wildlife areas to understand how the two can co-exist.
